
Whale - Paul Hale

- 1. Tried or tried-out was the process to extract oil from slices of blubber.
- 2. In 1838, Joseph Starbuck built the last whaler constructed at Brant Point and named it after himself the 'Joseph Starbuck'
- 3. 'Greasy luck' was wished to the crew on leaving meaning good luck and success in your search of whale.
- 4. With men being away from their homes for up to five years, women had to run the home and look after their children. They became business owners and independent. The return of their husbands was a temporary situation which soon grew irksome and both were happy for him to return to sea.
- 5. Whale boats would harpoon a whale and secure the boat while it was pulled along and the whale exhausted itself. This was referred to as the 'Nantucket sleighride'.
- 6. Trypots were iron cauldrons which where mounted on the deck and used to boil strips of blubber to extract the whale oil. The fires were started using wood and then fed with whale blubber to keep going hence the strong smell and smoke given off whale ships.
- 7. This is a nod to an era when America was at war with England and the cargoes of American ships were targets.
